All of these are foundational as we see changes related to UPCCs, PCNs, and contracts starting to impact our practices.

Our relationships with partner organizations have deepened through the struggles of the pandemic, and the groundwork has been laid to more effectively navigate the challenges Family Medicine faces. Our incoming Executive and Board are a group of exceptional physicians who I am certain will continue to lead us with strength and authenticity.

The gift of these pandemic years is that our collective tolerance for "good enough" is at a necessary all time low. Although often we speak and wish for being near the end of this chapter in our history, I personally hope we are still very much at the beginning. I hope this because I have witnessed that change is indeed possible and, truthfully, I am hungry for much more!

Physicians are weary from the strain of providing care during the pandemic while also living through it with our loved ones. One day, we will look back and see that we have been forever changed by our experiences. As Arundhati Roy said: "Historically, pandemics have forced humans to break with the past and imagine their world anew. This one is no different. It is a portal, a gateway between one world and the next."

Our healthcare system is failing our patients. It is failing us, as physicians and citizens. And we all deserve better.

British Columbians deserve a healthcare system founded on 21st century values and medical practices. Physicians want to return to the work that we love, caring for patients. We all need a healthcare system that recognizes our needs as human beings.

The pandemic prompted many of us to consider what's important in our lives. It's time for us to decide in healthcare too. How can we use our roles as physicians to imagine our world and our healthcare system anew? How can BC Family Doctors act to create a healthcare system where physicians are connected to purpose? How can the Physician Master Agreement be a tool to create a better tomorrow for all of us?

I truly believe that each small action that we take as we emerge from the pandemic will add up to the world we're creating. Your BC Family Doctors will be working with you and for you to create the future for family physicians in BC.

We need a full review of the governance, regulation and structures of healthcare delivery to protect the core tenets of primary care.


OUR FINANCES


